#### **BRSK Telegraph Poles**



In December a meeting took place at the Village Hall where BRSK discussed their plans with local residents about putting telegraph poles in the area to facilitate full fibre-to-home broadband. They said we would have more details in the new year, but as yet we've not really heard anything.

A number of residents expressed concern that a proliferation of new poles in an area that has very few visible poles and the associated trailing wires will not exactly improve the look of the area.

BRSK, BT and others including Virgin Media offer High Speed internet in this area and are in competition with each other. If you are not interested, you can simply bin the flyer.

Juliet Davies has said that we can formally object to the poles by completing an online form: https:// bit.ly/weoley-pole

Some residents may have no objection to the poles and hanging cables, but if you would like to press for an underground system instead, then use the form to express your concern.



A few years ago some people who live and/or work in Weoley Castle got together to think about how we could celebrate our community by telling and creating positive stories. We regularly get together to highlight what's great in our neighbourhood, to discuss ideas and see what we can make happen.

One of our favourite annual activities has been to write and deliver personalised Santa letters to over 200 hundred local children for the past four Christmases. One of us had the idea during the Covid pandemic as it had been such a difficult time for so many families. This proved so popular that we had requests from Newcastle!

Another annual event has been the planting of daffodil bulbs each Autumn in some of our green spaces. During Spring you'll notice these as you drive and walk around the estate. 

### **Your Stories**

#### 50 years of living on Weoley Hill



Some memories from the older residents amongst us.

The Cadbury family planned well for families on the estate, and on this side of Bristol Road there was a small open air swimming pool near where the squash court still stands, with parents responsible for keeping it clean. These were as well as all the facilities which we still use in Weoley Hill Park today. "When we first came to Fox Hill in 1973, our house cost £9,350; no central heating or shower, and with one or two gas points still remaining for the lights, although the lights themselves had long since been replaced."

The Post Office on the roundabout at Witherford Way was a real village shop, run then by David and Margaret Smith, providing local gossip as well as groceries, fresh bread, pensions etc. Just opposite was the local phone box, always well used. The local public areas, including the spinneys, were maintained by Mr Clarke and his son. BVT cannot afford such luxuries nowadays!

Young families were well served, with playgroup and toddler groups every week in the village hall, run by local mums. A token system for babysitting meant that it was free, and with about 20 families on the list, there was always someone who could come in and sit for you, even if you didn't know them well, and they didn't know your children! "You soon learned which parent thought it was ok to put her child to bed with a tube of Smarties, and the one who was likely to have no tokens left when it came to pay" Generally it worked extremely well, though.

As fewer young mothers went straight back to work full time, household incomes were lower, but expen-

sive childcare was not needed and there was much time for coffee with friends and their toddlers. There was a very successful summer playscheme too, during the school holidays, again organised by parents: " My garage wall still has evidence of wall painting!" "I remember the ginger beer plant drinks at the end of each one, probably slightly alcoholic but enjoyed by everyone"

The scouts were very important in the neighbourhood. Their regular jumble sales were a joy! Recycling all the children's outgrown clothes, as well as toys, books, adult clothes, furniture, etc. Parents turned up to help sort stuff out beforehand and to serve on the day. "My children grew up in jumble sale clothes" Excellent early recycling! "Do you remember the parent who played the piano to us while we sorted?"

Another recycling venture was the scout's monthly paper collection, where locals bundled up their old newspapers, as most households had papers delivered daily and there was a free daily Metro too. The youngsters loved leaping in and out of parents' cars to collect the bundles and off-load them to a large lorry in the URC carpark. (No council recycling was done then.) Cub football was the focus for many boys on Saturday mornings, but with no follow on for older boys. The tennis courts, then mostly shale, were run by and for a small exclusive club of adults only. No families or children allowed.

The thriving local gardening club held an annual show, with prizes for all categories including a children's section. Summer and Christmas parties entertained whole families every year too. Do you have any memories to add to these?
